Marathonorganised



GANGTOK, MARCH 12--/ Under the aegis of North Eastern Council (NEC), Government of India, along with Planning and Development Department and Sports and Youth Affairs Department, Government of Sikkim, a total of three marathon events of 75 km (Ultra Run), 35 km and 10 km, was organised by Serenity Home and Kalasha Ventures Pvt. Ltd. under the handle 'Tsomgo Ultra Xtreme Unleashed,' celebrating the Golden Jubilee of NEC, at Ganeshtok, Gangtok today. Karma Loday Bhutia, Minister, Forest Department, Environment and Wildlife Department, Mines, Mineral and

Geology Department and Science and Technology Department, Government of Sikkim, was present as the Chief Guest for the event, accompanied by V. B. Pathak, Chief Secretary, Government of Sikkim, as the Special Guest. Also present were Rinzing Chewang Bhutia, Secretary, Planning and Development Department, Udai Chandra Rai, Organiser and Founder of Serenity Home, welcomed the Chief Guest, Special Guest, and the Officers present for the event. He mentioned the event being organised is not just any event but a movement and an effort to

encourage everyone to live a healthy life and adopt the proper lifestyle. He also highlighted that the Ultra Run of 75 km is the first of its kind in the state, and he assured of making this a regular calendar event. Lastly, he thanked all for their presence and participation. A total of 153 athletes participated in the marathon, including 15 entries for 75 km, 61 for 35 km, and 77 for 10 km run. Participants from different walks of life, from students to high-ranking officials, prominent faces, and participants from other states and foreign countries, irrespective of age and gender, took part in the event. The event is the

second edition promoting sports tourism in the state, and the first edition was organised in 2021. The marathon events included a to-and-fro run where the participants for the 10 km run had to reach the 4th-mile junction and return to Ganeshtok. For the 35 km run, the participants had to go to Kanchenjunga viewpoint and return to Ganeshtok. Likewise, for the 75 km run, the participants had to reach Tsomgo, which could not be covered due to unfavourable weather conditions. The run was diverted from 15th Mile, and the runners had to come to Tashi viewpoint and back to Ganeshtok to complete the run. (IPR)

SCO countries should strive for judicial cooperation to make systems more approachable for common people: CJI Chandrachud

NEW DELHI, MARCH 12--/ Chief Justice of India D Y Chandrachud has stressed that the member states of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) should strive for judicial cooperation in order to make their judicial systems more approachable for the common people. In his concluding address to the 18th meeting of chief justices/ chairpersons of the Supreme Courts of the SCO member states hosted by Supreme Court of India, CJI Chandrachud emphasised upon the need to collectively adopt new mechanisms to make court processes simpler and more accessible. He highlighted several challenges facing the judicial systems in the SCO member states and how the conference allowed all member and observer states to reflect upon the challenges that are common to their jurisdictions. He also emphasized that these issues need to be tackled with mutual cooperation and by sharing experiences and wisdom gathered. A statement issued by the apex court said that while agreeing on a number of shared goals for the future of the judiciary of respective countries at the closure, Uzbekistan was collectively entrusted the presidency for the next meeting of chief justices/ chairpersons for the year 2024 on rotation. The two-day meet was held in New Delhi under the presidency Chief Justice Chandrachud on March 10-11 with an aim to foster effective judicial cooperation among the member states. "It was a two-day joint interaction session wherein all SCO member states, two observer states (Iran and Belarus), SCO Regional Anti-Terrorism Structure (RATS) and SCO Secretariat had taken part physically except Pakistan who joined through video conference," the statement of the apex court said. The session concluded with the signing of a joint statement. The intention to strengthen and expand cooperation among the Supreme Courts of the SCO member states and to

promote the use of technology to enhance the efficiency of the judicial system and access to justice were deliberated upon during the course of the meeting. After the meetings which concluded on Saturday, sources in the apex court said that the delegates visited Agra on Sunday. On March 10, in a joint interaction session, the CJI gave the brief description of the judicial system in India. Brief description of the judicial system followed in SCO member/observer states as well as the challenges faced and measures taken during the COVID-19 pandemic were also given. Besides the Chief Justice of India, other speakers who addressed the session include Aslambek Mergaliyev, Chairman of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Kazakhstan, Jinghong Gao, Vice-President of Supreme People's Court of the People's Republic of China, Zamirbek Bazarbekov, Chairman of the Supreme Court of the Kyrgyz Republic, Umar Ata Lebedev, and Vyacheslav M Lebedev, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Russian Federation. Other who spoke on the occasion include Valery Kalinkovich, first deputy chairman of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Belarus, Mohammad Mosaddegh Kahanmoe, first deputy of the Head of the Judiciary of the Islamic Republic of Iran, Janesh Kain, Deputy Secretary General, SCO Secretariat, and Rakesh Kumar Verma, deputy director, executive committee, RATS, SCO. CJI Chandrachud shared the challenges faced by the judicial institution during the COVID-19 pandemic and focussed on the measures such as the adoption of technology for virtual hearings, live-streaming of court proceedings, and e-filing undertaken by the Indian judiciary to ensure access to justice. He highlighted that the incorporation of technology in the Indian judicial system has made the judicial institutions more accessible for all its

citizens. "The heads of judiciaries who attended the meeting also shared the functioning of their judicial systems and challenges faced and innovative measures taken by their judiciaries to minimize the impact of COVID-19 pandemic," the press statement of the apex court said. On Saturday, the CJI opened the discussion on "smart courts" and the future of the judiciary. The CJI, while addressing the delegates, discussed India's smart court initiatives and stressed that the judicial system must ensure that timely and effective justice is delivered to all citizens, regardless of their location or socio-economic status. He said that technology must be used to bridge the gap between citizens and the justice system and shared that the "smart court" initiatives focused on simplifying procedures and increasing access for citizens to the justice delivery system through digital infrastructure. He highlighted the recent endeavours made by the apex court such as the launch of e-version of Supreme Court Reports, AI-based live transcription of court proceedings and translation of judgments in multiple regional languages. Participating in the discussion, Nail Akhmetzakirov, head of the court administration of the Republic of Kazakhstan, highlighted that the introduction of technology in their judicial facilities had made the court work and proceedings easy. He added that Kazakhstan has developed a new software post COVID-19 pandemic in order to make the electronic system in judicial services more accessible. Rakhat Karimova, Judge of the Bishkek City Court of the Kyrgyz Republic, informed the delegates that the judicial system of Kyrgyz Republic is focussed on the just and effective measures for the interest of people at large. The second topic of discussion was facilitating "access to justice". Justice S K Kaul of the apex court highlighted the importance of access to justice. He raised concerns

regarding overpopulated prisons by undertrials and emphasized that the issue of access to quality legal representation is a key element in the criminal justice system. Participating in the discussion, Xiaochen Qiann, Chief Judge of case-filing division of the Supreme People's Court of China, added that it was of the prime importance for the growth of the judiciary that modern public judicial services are built, featuring inclusiveness, equity, convenience, efficiency, intelligence and accuracy. Vyacheslav M Lebedev, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Russian Federation, highlighted that several laws have been created to protect the citizens including the system of claims, which can be filed by the plaintiffs at their own place of residence, allowing remote participation in court sessions, notifications via SMS regarding time and place of trial and availability of information regarding working of the court. In the third topic of discussion, "Institutional Challenges facing Judiciary: Delays, Infrastructure, Representation, and Transparency", Justice K M Joseph of the top court highlighted the issue of high pendency of cases and the need for adequate infrastructure facilities as a means to access to justice. The SCO members include China, India, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, Russia, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan. Afghanistan, Belarus, Iran and Mongolia constitute the SCO observers while Armenia, Azerbaijan, Cambodia and Nepal are the SCO dialogue partners. The SCO was created in 2001 on the basis of "Shanghai five" formed by Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, China, Russia and Tajikistan and its main goal is to strengthen mutual trust, friendship and good neighbourliness, encouraging effective cooperation in several areas among the member states. Legal Service Camp

NAMCHI, MARCH 12--/ The District Legal Service Authority (DLSA) in collaboration with Sikkim State Legal Service Authority (SSLSA) conducted a Legal Service Camp under the banner of "Mega Legal Awareness Programme" at Central Park, Namchi, today. The programme was organized by DLSA Namchi and TALUK Legal Service Authority, Namchi, Yangyang, and Jorethang under the aegis of National Legal Service Authority. The programme was attended by Samita Sharma, District and Session Judge Namchi cum Chairperson, District Legal Service Authority, Mrs. Rohini Rai, Ld. Civil Judge cum Judicial Magistrate Jorethang cum Secretary (I/ C) District Legal Service Authority, Mr B.B Pradhan, Administrative Officer District and Sessions Court, Namchi, Mr. Kumar Sharma Ld Panel Advocate, Mrs. Kesang Doma Bhutia, Tele Law, Panel Advocate. Besides Official and Staff members from different line departments were also present during the programme. The camp was attended by a total of 755 participants including girl students. It aimed to create awareness among women about their legal rights and to help them avail different schemes. Various other departments had set up stalls to disseminate information, providing opportunity to interact with officials and obtain information about legal rights and procedures. It was an opportunity for them to interact with legal experts and get their queries addressed. During the event, various topics related to legal services, legal aid, and schemes were discussed, and the visitors were encouraged to ask questions and seek clarification. Overall, the legal service camp was a great initiative taken by the DLSA and SSLSA to empower women with knowledge about their legal rights. The programme underscores the importance of legal services in the development and growth of a society. It was a step in the right direction towards creating a more aware and educated society. (IPR)

Islamic State conspiracy case: NIA searches 5 locations in MP, Maharashtra

NEW DELHI, MARCH 12--/ The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has carried out searches at five places in Madhya Pradesh and Maharashtra as part of its ongoing investigation to unravel a conspiracy hatched by the global terror group Islamic State to expand its activities in India, an official said on Sunday. The searches were conducted by different teams at the houses of the suspected persons at four places in Seoni (Madhya Pradesh) and one location in Pune (Maharashtra), a spokesperson of the anti-terror federal agency said. Following up on the investigational leads, the official said, NIA teams searched the houses of suspects Talha Khan in Pune and Akram Khan in Seoni in the Islamic State- Khorasan Province (ISKP) case. "This case was initially registered by Delhi Police special cell after the arrest of a Kashmiri couple - Jahanzaib Sami Wani and his wife Hina Bashir Beigh - from Okhla in Delhi. The couple was found to be affiliated with ISKP," the spokesperson said. During investigations, the role of another accused, Abdullah Basith, who was already lodged in Tihar Jail in another case being investigated by the NIA, emerged, the official said. The NIA also carried out searches at three other locations in Seoni in the Shivamogga Islamic State conspiracy case. The places searched included the residential and commercial premises of suspects Abdul Aziz Salafi and Shoaib Khan, the official said. On the Shivamogga case, the NIA said that as part of a conspiracy hatched from abroad, the accused persons - Mohamed Shariq, Maaz Muneer Khan, Yasin and others - based on instructions of their handler based abroad, targeted public and private properties such as warehouses, liquor shops, hardware shops, vehicles and other properties belonging to members of a particular community and committed over 25 incidents of arson and sabotage. "They even carried out a mock IED blast. They were being funded through crypto-currencies by their online handler.

As part of the larger conspiracy, accused Shariq planned to carry out IED blast at Kadri temple, Mangalore on November 19 last year but the IED exploded prematurely through an accident, when the perpetrator was enroute to the target location," the official said. The spokesperson said Salafi (40) is a prayer leader at the Seoni Jamia Masjid, while 26-year-old impressionable Shoaib sells automobile spare parts. "Salafi, along with his accomplice Shoaib, were found actively propagating pernicious ideas such as voting in elections is sinful for Muslims'. The group led by Salafi was in the process of radicalizing gullible Muslim youths of MP, Maharashtra and many southern states through provocative and inflammatory speeches on YouTube," the spokesperson said. The official said they were also trying to bring together such radicalized individuals in Seoni district. The spokesperson said that from the material seized during the searches, it has come to light that this group was actively collecting information about ongoing activities and events in different jihadi theatres, including Afghanistan. "Initial examination of the suspects have brought out the fact that they are radically motivated individuals, who totally abhor the idea of democracy in India, and were preparing for carrying out jihad against the people who believe otherwise," the agency said. The spokesperson said they were using social media platforms for dissemination of such false propaganda to impressionable youths. "In furtherance of such efforts, Salafi was also in contact with the arrested accused Maaz Muneer Ahmed of Karnataka who had procured the explosive materials for the trial blast. Ahmed was arrested by NIA in November last year," the spokesperson said. The official said further investigations into the connections of these accused in the spread of Islamic State ideology in India are being continued to unearth the whole conspiracy. (PTI)

Couple from Myanmar held in Manipur for staying in India with fake Aadhaar

IMPHAL, MARCH 12--/ (PTI) A couple from Myanmar was arrested in Manipur's Imphal West district for "illegally staying in India with fake Aadhaar documents", a state minister said on Sunday. A local was also apprehended on the charge of "providing shelter to foreign nationals who entered Indian territory without valid documents", Information and Public Relations Minister Sapam Ranjan told reporters here. "The Myanmar couple was arrested by the Manipur Police from the residence of the local on March 9," Ranjan said. All the arrested persons were remanded to police custody till March 14, he said. Speaking about the foreign nationals, Ranjan said, the couple hailing northern Myanmar entered India with "false documents" in January this year and took shelter at the residence of the local. The man from the neighbouring country had previously studied at an institute in Nagaland's Dimapur and worked as a teacher at a college there, Ranjan said. In 2017, he returned to Myanmar and became a pastor in a church in the Sagaing region of Myanmar" the minister said. (PTI)

IMPHAL, MARCH 12--/ Three workers of the banned militant outfit People's Liberation Army (PLA) were nabbed by security forces from Manipur's Imphal West district, police said on Sunday. Based on intelligence inputs, Assam Rifles nabbed the three from Kakwa Nameirakpam locality in the district on Saturday, the police said. Two Chinese hand

grenades along with one Berretta 9mm pistol were seized from their possession. Investigation revealed that they were working under the command of one Ayeekpam Dhamen Singh, a self-styled major of the outfit. The three PLA workers were handed over to the Singjamei police station for further necessary legal action. (PTI)

SC appoints amicus curiae to help it decide if lawmakers can claim immunity from prosecution for taking bribe to vote

NEW DELHI, NOV 15 /--/ The Supreme Court on Tuesday appointed senior advocate P S Patwalia as amicus curiae to assist it in examining whether an MP or MLA can claim immunity from criminal prosecution for taking bribe to make a speech or vote in the Legislative Assembly or Parliament.

A five-judge constitution bench headed by Justice S A Nazeer also asked advocate Gaurav Agarwal to assist Patwalia in the matter. The bench, also comprising Justices B R Gavai, A S Bopanna, V Ramasubramanian, and B V Nagarathna, said it will hear the issue on December 6, 2022. In 2019, a bench headed by then chief justice Ranjan Gogoi and comprising Justices S Abdul Nazeer and Sanjiv Khanna had referred to a five-judge bench the crucial question, noting it had "wide ramifications" and was of "substantial public importance". The three-judge bench had then said it will revisit its 24-year-old verdict in the sensational Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM) bribery case on an appeal

filed by Sita Soren, a JMM MLA from Jama constituency in Jharkhand.

The top court, in its 1998 five-judge constitution bench verdict delivered in the PV Narasimha Rao versus CBI case, had held that parliamentarians had immunity under the Constitution against criminal prosecution for any speech made and vote cast inside the

house. She had appealed against the Jharkhand High Court order of February 17, 2014 refusing to quash a criminal case lodged against her for allegedly taking bribe to vote for a particular candidate in the Rajya Sabha elections held in 2012. She was charged by the CBI with allegedly taking bribe from one candidate and voting for another. Sita Soren is the

daughter-in-law of former union minister and Jharkhand chief minister Shibu Soren, who was a key accused in the JMM bribery case. Shibu Soren, along with his four-party MPs, had allegedly taken bribe to vote against the no-confidence motion against the then P V Narasimha Rao government at the Centre in July 1993. (PTI)

3) Attention is invited to the following:														
a) The net worth of the Company has been eroded, which has been substantially effected the going concern assumption of the Company.The Company is having substantial investment which is not yielding any return. However,expectation are there of good returns depending on the improvement of market scenario. The Company is not in a position to meet its financial commitments and the chance of possible inflow of Fund depends on the future business development which is in offing.														
b) Total receivable from M/s Tantia Agrochemicals Pvt.Ltd.(TAPL) including interest thereon at the end of the year was Rs.52 lacs. No interest have been considered during the period as the said company is under liquidation.														
c) In the absence of loan agreement indicating the terms and conditions, no interest was charged on loan of Rs.75 lacs given to one party.														
d) No provision has been made in respect of interest expenses on loan of Rs.282 lacs taken from a party without execution of terms and conditions of the agreement.														
e) No provision has been made in respect of interest on loan taken due to financial constraint . The same has resulted in under statement of loss for the period by Rs.42.81 lacs on loan of Rs.949.44 lacs. The statutory Auditors of the Company have modified their Auditor's Report in this regard.														
4) The Company could not meet the minimum requirement of Net Owned Fund (NOF) of Rs.200 lacs, in accordance with the provisions of Reserve Bank of India Act, 1934 applicable to Non Banking Financial Companies (NBFCs). Consequently upon the same Reserve Bank of India has cancelled the NBFC Certificate of Registration issued by it to the Company on 20.11.2018. However,steps are being taken to revive the business of NBFCs of the Company by fulfilling the minimum requirement of NOF.
